


### Week 12

Temptation come in a various of forms




# But as we known even unseen actions - so often have repercussion

Early scripture describes a dark forbearing underworld of no return


For in death there is no remembrance of you: in Sheol who can give you praise?

Psalm 6.5

The dead do not praise the Lord, nor do any that go down into silence Psalm 115.17

For Sheol cannot thank you, death cannot praise you; those who go down to the Pit cannot hope for your faithfulness.

Isaiah 38.18





However, as the presence of the Holy Spirit continued to develop people's understanding of the loving parental nature of God another option started to offer people hope

Everything that the Father gives me will come to me, and anyone who comes to me I will never drive away; for I have come down from heaven, not to do my own will, but the will of him who sent me. And this is the will of him who sent me, that I should lose nothing of all that he has given me but raise it up on the last day. This is indeed the will of my Father, that all who see the Son and believe in him may have eternal life; and I will raise them up on the last day John 6.37-40

I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live, even though he dies

John 11.25-26

Truly, I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise Luke 23.43



But how was this promise of everlasting life going to be achieved?

The Second Coming (*Parousia*) a belief reinforced and publicly announced in the words of The Nicene Creed (during the Sunday Eucharist) reminds the world that Jesus would physically return to the earth....*In accordance with the scriptures, he (Jesus) ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.* 

All of which may explain why some chosen to be buried as apposed to being cremated for does Jesus need our body complete if he is going them up to Heaven?



So we have Sheol (Hell) and eternal paradise (Heaven) but the concept of a middle ground felt necessary which is where the idea of Purgatory came into play. A time/state of preparation cleansing your soul before moving toward Heaven

Now is the judgement of this world John 12.31

Some Christians also feel the Heaven is not some reward for services rendered 'down here' but simply of another example of God's generous heart

For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God Ephesians 2.8

Whereby others stress the Day of Judgement when our deeds will be taken into account

Matthew 25, 31-32
